Field Trip Report

The April field trip was to three sites – Paiute Cave, Nampaweap and the Unikaret pueblo ruin, all on the Arizona Strip.

Paiute Cave is a Lava tube with remarkable pictographs in various colors – white, red and yellow.

The Nampaweap site, located near Mt. Trumbull, is one of the largest petroglyph sites on the Arizona strip. It is about 1/2 mile long and it contains thousands of images on hundreds of boulders.



The Unikaret pueblo, located near Nampaweap, is a large pit house complex consisting of many rooms blocks in a circular pattern around a center courtyard.

The April lecture was “The Big Horn Medicine Wheel” by Virgil “Woody” Baston. Woody discussed his personal experiences with the wheel that date back to his childhood and as a cowboy in the Big Horn Mountains of Wyoming.

Woody described the wheel and the various solar alignments predicted by the wheel.



He gave his theory for the purpose of the wheel – a calendar that predicted when it was time to leave the mountain before the winter storms arrived.
